### Course Requirements

There are three components of the work required of you:

- come to class prepared and participate through thoughtful comments and questions
- attend all writing seminars
- complete all writing assignments and response papers (see below)

#### GRADES

There will be three writing assignments (4-6 pages) on selected topics:

First paper	due October 23 <sup>rd</sup> , in class	worth $20\%$
Second paper	due November 13 <sup>th</sup> , in class	worth $25\%$
Third paper	due December 11 <sup>th</sup> , 5pm	worth $30\%$

The remaining 25% will be determined by your class participation (15%) and two response papers (5% each).

Late papers will be docked a grade per day (e.g., B+ to B) unless you have received approval ahead of time.

Response papers will consist of short discussions (2–3 pages) of an assigned reading, to be submitted the day before the reading is discussed by 5pm (simply email me). The choice of reading is up to you, but at least one of them must be done by October 25<sup>th</sup>, the second by November 29<sup>th</sup>. These discussions should express your personal reflections upon the reading for that session. They are meant to express your thoughtful reactions to the readings before they are discussed in class.
